ADVANCED CHAT'S RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE TOWN:

CHAT discussed several recommendations in detail, including:

- Developing a flood risk disclosure policy to help ensure that potential property buyers and renter are informed about past flooding and whether a property is located within the 100-year floodplain. New Hampshire State Representative Chris Muns worked with CHAT to develop a flood risk disclosure policy. The bill (HB1320) is based on New Jersey's flood risk disclosure law.
- 2. Allow parking in municipal parking lots when tides are in excess of 9.5 feet, as opposed to 10.0 feet.

CHAT MEMBERS INITIATED AND PARTICIPATED IN MANY RELATED EFFORTS:

Town of Hampton and Hampton Beach Area Commission Master Plan Updates • Flood Engineering Studies • Grant Applications • Water Quality Testing • Floodplain Ordinance Audit and Revisions

CHAT's mission is to evaluate, assist, support, educate, and advise on current and future coastal flooding adaptation strategies for the Town.

WHAT's NEXT?

In 2024, CHAT plans to:

- Continue outreach and education about coastal hazards and adaptation efforts.
- Support implementation of Resilience Actions in Hampton's Master Plan.
- Encourage cross communication between Town of Hampton staff, board, commission, and committee members, and residents. Engage state and elected officials and the business community.
- Look for opportunities to collaborate with others to advance CHAT's objectives.
- Continue to refine CHAT's list of recommendations for the Town of Hampton to increase resilience and identify ways that CHAT can assist with implementing the recommendations.
- Continue to investigate options to strengthen the Town's parking placard program.
- Investigate topics such as incorporating resilience into the municipal Capital Improvements Plan and voluntary elevation and buyout programs.
- Follow the latest science and research on sea level rise, coastal hazards, and climate adaptation and mitigation.
- Follow, learn about, and engage in the Town of Hampton's and others' planning efforts, projects, and studies related to sea level rise, coastal hazards, and flooding.
